

APPOINTED ALABAMA SECRETARY OF STATE

Jacksonville State University again can boast of a highly placed state official, as JSU Board of Trustees Chair Jim Bennett '62 has been appointed Alabama Secretary of State for the second time in his career. Governor Robert Bentley announced the appointment on Tuesday, July 9, 2013. Bennett will succeed Secretary of State Beth Chapman, who stepped down on July 31.

During his time at JSU, Bennett served as SGA representative, was band announcer for the Southerners, and was editor of the *Collegian*, predecessor of the *Chanticleer*. After graduating from JSU, Bennett went straight to the *Birmingham Post Herald* where he served as a reporter in the Alabama capital in the early 1960s. Bennett can recall interviewing such historical figures as George Wallace and Martin Luther King, Jr.

Bennett later went into public relations for a period of time in Birmingham. In 1978, he was elected to the Alabama legislature.

For over thirty years, Bennett has served the people of Alabama in various government positions. A member of the Alabama State House of Representatives from 1978-1983, Bennett went on to serve in the Alabama State Senate from 1983-1993. In 1993, Bennett was appointed secretary of state. Later, he was elected twice, serving in this capacity for ten years. He became known for his work to combat absentee ballot abuse and to increase the accuracy of voter rolls by making sure names of the deceased were removed. He later served the people of Alabama as labor commissioner.

Governor Bentley said Bennett's distinguished record of service made him well qualified to complete the current term as secretary of state.

"Jim is a dedicated public servant," Governor Bentley said in the release announcing Bennett's appointment. "He was a trusted member of my cabinet where he served as Labor Commissioner until his retirement in 2012. Having previously

served as Secretary of State, Jim is uniquely qualified to lead the Secretary of State's Office through the 2014 election cycle. I know Jim will fight for every Alabamian's right to vote. I appreciate his willingness to serve and know he will be an honest and dedicated Secretary of State."

Bennett has felt very blessed in his political journey and is thankful for the many opportunities he has been given.

"It is a distinct honor to return to the Secretary of State's Office where I served for ten years from 1993-2003," Bennett said. "I appreciate Governor Bentley's confidence in my ability to lead the effort for honest elections and to support the opportunity for all citizens to actively participate in government through the voting process. This is especially important with the 2014 election cycle a short time ahead. To those who would seek to manipulate our most basic right to decide issues and elections fairly and honestly at the ballot box, my appointment will not come as good news." 🗳️

Jacksonville State University recognized Outstanding Faculty Award winners, faculty research, tenure and promotion recipients as well as retirees and scholars at the annual Faculty Awards Program in May.

The Earlon and Betty McWhorter Outstanding Teacher Award, established in 1993, was awarded to Dr. Jaedeok Kim, associate professor, Department of Mathematics, Computing and Information Sciences.

Dr. Kim will receive an honorarium of \$500, a budget of \$500 for expenses, and a framed certificate that recognizes this accomplishment.

The Cleo and Carla Thomas Award for Outstanding Community Education and Service, established in the spring of 1999 and funded by Cleophus Thomas Jr., Esq., and Dr. Carla Thomas, was awarded to Dr. Nixon Mwebi, associate professor, Department of Physical and Earth Sciences. Dr. Mwebi will receive an honorarium of \$500, a \$500 budget for

expenses, and a framed certificate that recognizes this accomplishment.

The Faculty Scholar Lecture Award, established in the spring of 1998, was awarded to Dr. Jimmy Triplett, assistant professor, Department of Biology. Dr. Triplett will deliver a lecture, or an appropriate presentation, to the university community during the academic year of the award. He will also receive an honorarium of \$500 and a budget of \$500 for expenses.

The Raymond and Ruth Ringer Faculty Development Award, established in the spring of 2008 by Robert E. Ringer in memory of his parents, Raymond J. and Ruth Chisolm Ringer, was awarded to Dr. Rob Landry, associate professor, Department of Finance, Economics and Accounting. Dr. Landry will receive an honorarium in the amount of \$1000 in support of scholarship, community service, and teaching.

Also being recognized at the awards program were Dr. Emily Sims and

Dr. Rhonda Kilgo for receiving their doctorates. Dr. Sims is an assistant professor of secondary education and Dr. Kilgo is an assistant professor of mathematics.

JACKSONVILLE STATE UNIVERSITY
NEW HEAD WOMEN'S BASKETBALL COACH

Rick Pietri has been named head women's basketball coach at Jacksonville State University following the resignation of Annette Watts.

Pietri spent the last thirteen seasons as the head coach at South Alabama and helped turn the Lady Jags into a contender in the Sun Belt Conference, capturing back-to-back Sun Belt West Division titles in 2003 and 2004.

South made consecutive WNIT postseason appearances both in 2003 and 2004, and Pietri is the all-time winningest coach in Lady Jaguars history with a career record of 220-167. Prior to his arrival, South Alabama had posted ten straight losing seasons.

"I'm tremendously excited about the opportunity to be the head coach at Jacksonville State," said Pietri. "The chance to move a program forward, much in the way I did when I arrived at South Alabama, is very exciting to me. I know that it is going to be a challenge, but one that I am up to."

Pietri's turnaround of the South Alabama program started with his first team, during the 2000-01 season, as the Jags finished with a record of 13-16. It was the most wins for the program in over ten years and was just two wins fewer than the fifteen wins combined over the previous two seasons.

The turnaround continued the next season, as USA raced out to a 16-5 record in its first twenty-one games and posted the first winning season since the 1989-90 season with a 17-11 record. The next year, the Lady Jags finished 22-7 after opening the season with a 14-1 record and won the division crown for the second straight year.

During Pietri's tenure, the Jags posted a 130-54 (.707) record at home, including setting an arena record with fourteen home wins during the 2008-09 season.

The Jags finished with a winning record in five of Pietri's last six years, including three straight years with a 17-13 record from 2010-11 through the 2012-13 season.

A South Alabama alum, Pietri began his collegiate coaching career as a men's assistant at Spring Hill College for four seasons (1989-93), before joining Duane Reboul's staff at Birmingham Southern in 1993-94.

Pietri's first head coaching job was as the boys' coach at B.C. Rain High School (1994-98), where he went 106-32 in four seasons, making four straight Final Four appearances and earning 5A Coach of the Year honors in 1998. He then spent two seasons coaching the boys at St. Paul's Episcopal School in Mobile before taking the job at South Alabama in April of 2000. 📞

DANIEL WATTS

PLAYED IN ALL STAR GAME



Former Jacksonville State pitcher, Daniel Watts was named to the Midwest League's All-Star game, which was played on June 18th in Dayton, Ohio.

Watts started, pitching one inning where he did not allow a hit and had a pair of strikeouts.

At the time of his selection to the team, Watts led the Midwest League with an 8-3 record with a 3.74 earned run average. He had started twelve games, pitched 74.2 innings and allowed just thirty-one earned runs. He had forty-eight strikeouts and only twenty-three walks, while allowing seventy-four hits.

The LaGrange, Ga., native was drafted by the Arizona Diamondbacks in the 32nd round of the 2012 Major League Baseball Draft and currently plays for the Class A affiliate, South Bend Silver Hawks in Indiana.

The former Troup County (Ga.) prep star made fifty-four appearances during his Gamecock career, posting a 15-19 record in thirty-seven career starts. He tossed 200.2 innings with 193 strikeouts to just 78 walks, while giving up 141 earned runs for a career 6.32 ERA. 📞

DONOVAN HAND

MAKES MLB DEBUT



Reliever Donovan Hand was one of the final cuts coming out of spring training for the Milwaukee Brewers, ultimately losing out for the last spot in the bullpen. But less than two months into the season, Hand has earned a spot in the big leagues.

Hand, who turned twenty-seven in April, spent his first six professional seasons in the minor leagues. The Brewers took him as their thirteenth pick in the baseball draft of 2007. He finished his three-year Gamecock career with a 26-16 record, and is second on JSU's all-time career wins list.

Hand was pitching in relief for his fourth season with the Nashville Sounds when the call came. He and his wife, Haley, excitedly hopped a 7 a.m. flight out of Nashville as he joined the Brewers in Milwaukee. "I'm definitely excited to be here and hopefully help this team win," Hand told the Journal-Sentinel upon his arrival.

From Hatton, Ala., Hand was an All-OVC selection for three straight years and led the Gamecocks with seven wins and 82 strikeouts in 2007; he went 9-5 in 2006 and was 10-3 as a freshman in 2005. He was named a Louisville Slugger Freshman All-American in 2005 and was also named the OVC Freshman of the Year. 📞

COTY BLANCHARD

DRAFTED BY TAMPA DAY RAYS



Jacksonville State's Coty Blanchard was drafted by the Tampa Bay Rays in the 15th round of the 2013 MLB Draft.

Blanchard becomes the 24th player in Gamecock baseball history to be taken in the Top 15 rounds and it marks the second straight year after Ben Waldrip was drafted in the 10th round last year. He is the 16th player that has been drafted under JSU head coach Jim Case.


The former Cherokee County High School product earned second-team All-Ohio Valley Conference honors this spring as a utility player and was listed as a second baseman on the MLB Draft Tracker.

Blanchard was second on the team against OVC pitching, where he hit .363 with two homers and fourteen doubles against conference opponents. He also drew twenty walks to post a .460 on-base percentage.

On the season, Blanchard posted a .305 average with nineteen doubles, four home runs and thirty-seven RBIs, while swiping seventeen bases.

Blanchard, who helped the Gamecocks earn the No. 4 seed and advance to their 10th straight OVC Tournament appearance as a junior in 2013, was the sixth highest selection under Case. 📞

Dr. Sarah Latham Retires after over 30 YEARS OF TEACHING



After over thirty years of training the minds and impacting the lives of nursing students, Dr. Sarah Vines Latham has retired from the Jacksonville State University College of Nursing (CON) where she has been an instructor for thirty-one of her total thirty-four years of teaching.

When choosing her career field, Dr. Latham explains, "I loved math and science and was attracted to the medical field, but I also had a clear vision of the kind of family life I wanted. I wanted a career that was intellectually challenging and one that made a difference in people's

lives, but I also wanted a profession that allowed me to put family first."

It was not until Latham's brother-in-law, a physician, encouraged her to consider a career in nursing that Latham even entertained the idea of majoring in nursing. Latham had only to get into her first nursing course to realize that this was a perfect career match for her.

In her career, Dr. Latham has received various awards and honors such as the Alabama League for Nursing Lamplighter Award in Recognition of Exemplary Achievements in Service to

Others ('95), Cottaquilla Council of Girl Scouts Women Committed to Excellence Award-Outstanding Educator ('99), JSU Outstanding Teacher Award ('99 - '00), and JSU National Alumni Association Outstanding Faculty Award ('07).

Latham received her BSN from the University of Alabama School of Nursing in 1973 and went on to the University of Alabama at Birmingham (UAB) School of Nursing to receive her MSN in 1975, concentrating as a clinical specialist in Adult Health Nursing, Educator Role.

In 1978, Latham's husband, who is a dentist, was recruited to Piedmont. During this time, Latham had already been teaching nursing courses at UAB, which allowed her to realize that teaching nursing classes was one of her "great passions."

After the Latham's move, Sarah accepted a teaching position at JSU in 1982 and went on to earn her doctorate from UAB in 1985. Latham has since taught nursing students in the traditional BSN, RN to BSN, and MSN programs.

In 2004, Dr. Latham was appointed dean and, at that time, the RN to BSN program and the MSN program in the CON were modest with only 9 and 29 students respectively. Under Dr. Latham's leadership, those programs transitioned

Association, AARP, ACHE, the Alabama Board of Nursing and all nursing programs in the state. Team Alabama directed collaborative efforts, under the auspices of the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, the US Department of Labor, and AARP in implementing strategies to increase the number of nursing faculty in the United States.

Though her resume is quite impressive, it is evident that Dr. Latham is incredibly passionate about her work.

Latham explains, "Nursing is a combination of art and science...My specialty, critical care, involves high tech gadgetry. But just as important, and in many cases more importantly, I love the art of nursing which involves establishing rapport with

Travelino Keller Communications Group in Atlanta and is a contributing reporter for NPR, *Travel + Leisure*, *Coastal Living*, *Southern Living*, *Preservation Magazine*, and *Cooking with Paula Dean*. He also hosts a storytelling podcast called "Authentic South" and is in the process of finishing a book on country music stars and their recipes.

After finishing graduate school, their younger son, Aaron Latham, worked as a communication director for a U.S. congressman in Washington D.C. Upon returning to Alabama, Aaron served as the communications director for the University of Alabama School of Law and taught classes in communications and political science at UA. Aaron is now public

to completely online and enrollment grew exponentially to 340 and 64 respectively. Student enrollment for all programs increased from 240 in fall 2004 to 666 in fall 2012. The faculty also grew from 17 to 27, resulting in the addition of a full-time clinical associate and two additional directors to the CON staff. There have also been numerous technological advancements for the classroom under Dr. Latham's deanship.

Since 2004, JSU's Provost and Vice President of Academic and Student Affairs, Dr. Rebecca Turner, and the CON have sponsored nursing faculty participation in fifty-four national conferences, fourty state level conferences and eleven international conferences.

Dr. Latham has served on a multitude of university committees and also served at the state level as chair of both the State of Alabama Association of College of Nursing and chair of the Alabama Council of Administrators of Professional Nursing Education Programs.

Dr. Latham represented the state on "Team Alabama," a consortium of leaders representing the Alabama Hospital

individuals and families experiencing life crises...The art of nursing is connecting with the person first, reading their verbal and non-verbal messages, learning what is most important to them, teaching them what they can do to support healing or dying more peacefully. It is an honor and a privilege to be that instrumental in the quality of someone's life...To be an effective nurse, every aspect of who we are as people is challenged. Nursing is intellectually stimulating, it requires high level reasoning and problem solving, and in its purest form, nursing is a vehicle to show compassion and caring, to affirm the worth of others."

On her life, Latham states, "God has blessed me beyond my ability to comprehend. I'm married to the finest man I've ever known...Our children continue to amaze and bless us."

Latham and her husband celebrate forty years of being together and have plenty of reason to take pride in their children.

Their older son, Tanner Latham, wrote for *Southern Living* for ten years and currently works as content director for

relations strategy and research coordinator at Alabama Power Company, where he develops strategies and messages for communicating with targeted audiences. He and his wife, Megan, are expecting a child soon.

The Lathams are very much looking forward to the birth of their first grandchild and in the meantime, Dr. Latham states she is "embracing life in retirement."

After undergoing a "grueling" battle with cancer in 2008, Dr. Latham is in her fifth year of remission and explains, "I am savoring each moment of life, taking time to nurture relationships, digging in the dirt, and looking very carefully for what the Lord wants me to do."

JSU would like to congratulate Dr. Latham on her over thirty years of service to the university and wish her the best in all of her future endeavors.
