
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A heat source too close to the Christmas tree causes 1 in every 4 winter fires.

#### Holiday Safety: Staying Safe During the Holiday Season

The holiday season is here, and many individuals and families are setting up their Christmas trees and planning out their holiday meals. Unfortunately, this time of year also sees an uptick in house fires. Christmas trees, holiday decorations, candles, holiday cooking, and fireworks are the common culprits for this seasonal increase in fire events, according to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA).

To help you promote fire awareness within your community, the U.S. Fire Administration has compiled free handouts and posters, as well as a social media toolkit with messages, graphics, stock photos, and videos focused on holiday fire safety. The NFPA also offers insightful holiday safety materials, including safety tip sheets and educational coloring pages and activity sheets for children. The U.S. Fire Administration offers several holiday safety tips. Protect your own family by only using flame-retardant or nonflammable decorations. Check your family's holiday lights for frayed wires or signs of excessive wear, and don't link more than three strands of holiday lights together. Don't leave burning candles unattended and consider opting for battery-operated flameless candles instead. Live Christmas trees should be kept away from heat sources and room exits. Check on your live tree daily to keep it from become dry.



### **Holiday Celebrations During COVID-19**

The above map is a current snapshot of the current confirmed cases in the United States. If you are planning to travel, keep in mind the current state of COVID-19 in your final destination as well as the necessary steps to ensure a safe and enjoyable holiday season for yourself and your loved ones who may be increasingly susceptible to the virus. Below are just a few tips to get you through the holiday season.

Considerations for Hosting or Gathering

- 1. Check the COVID-19 infection rate in areas where you live or where gatherings will be hosted. Based on the data, consider if it is safe to hold or attend the proposed gathering.
- 2. Limit the number of attendees as much as possible to allow people from different households and areas of residence to maintain the appropriate 6-feet distance.
- 3. If possible, host outdoor rather than indoor gatherings. Even if outdoor, require guest to wear masks when not eating or drinking.
- 4. Avoid holiday gatherings in crowded, poorly ventilated areas.
- 5. Increase ventilation for indoor activates by open windows or allowing continuous heating / air circulation during the event.
- 6. Require guest to wear masks.
- 7. Encourage, or provide, guests with appropriate sanitation items (i.e. hand sanitizer) and encourage frequent handwashing.
- 8. Limit contact with commonly touched areas. Recommend having at least one person that serves food opposed to buffet style serving at family gatherings.
- 9. Clean and disinfect as often as possible and recommend using touchless garbage can lids.
- 10. Set guidelines for behavior before and during the event to ensure that everyone is on the same accord and enforce as applicable to ensure the safety of everyone.
- 11. If traveling, ensure that you utilize proper PPE, and consider flights that are less likely to be fully crowded (i.e. red-eye flights).
