#### **Friends Board Meets**

n May 21, 1998, the Board of Directors of Friends of Houston Cole Library met to discuss ideas and recommendations for further growth and expanded visibility. The meeting was called to order by Kenneith Calvert, Board Chairperson. Mary Williams was introduced as a new Board member. and copies of the Constitution and Bylaws were distributed. Other members present were William Hubbard, Robert Lokey, Betty Rowe, Douglas Wilson, and Steve Whitton.

Kenneith Calvert suggested that the spring program be moved to the fall so as not to compete with "On the Brink" or "Kaleidoscope." The change, she suggested, might increase atten-

dance at our programs. Mr. Wilson pointed out that the Bylaws would need to be changed in order to make the move.

Ms: Calvert also expressed the need to schedule a well-known writer who would attract a larger audience, add memberships, and increase interest in the organization. As a part of the discussion that followed, it was agreed that this would require the allocation of more funds to cover the costs for such a person. Mary Williams made a motion that we bring such a writer for a Fall, 1999 program. It was approved by a majority of the Board. Mr. Whitton, Mr. Lokey, and Ms. Williams volunteered to make inquiries and explore grant possibilities.

A third item of discussion was a proposal by Ms. Calvert that the Friends produce a newsletter. After reviewing an example from another Friends organization and discussing possible costs, the idea was accepted and work has begun for the first issue.

Because of time constraints, a review of the Constitution and Bylaws was postponed to the next meeting scheduled for Thursday, July 9.

#### **Two Houston Cole Librarians Retiring**

ith almost 100 years of combined service as educators, two Houston Cole librarians--Miss Jimmy Nell Williams and Sister Janice Costello, O. P .-- are retiring.

After 40 years as an educator, Iimmie Nell Williams will retire August 31. She earned a B. S. degree in education with a social science major and library science minor at the University of North Alabama, Later she earned an M. S. degree in library science from George Peabody College, now associated with Vanderbilt Universitv.

Williams began her career at Fairview High School in Cullman County, where she was librarian for four years. She then worked as librarian for 10 years at the University of Montevallo.

In 1968, she began her 30 year tenure at ISU as government documents librarian. Bill Hubbard,

Director of Houston Cole Library for 10 years, points out that the library is going through a gradual progression from paper and microfiche to a digital format. "Iimmie Nell has been in the midst of these changes and functioned well," he says. "The library is a depository for government documents and undergoes federal inspections frequently. We passed with flying colors under Iimmie Nell's supervision in both 1990 and 1997."

Williams served as moderator of the Government Documents Roundtable. She has been an active member of the Alabama Library Association, AEA, and NEA. She is a member of Friends of Houston Cole Library, Reading, Thinking, Sharing--a discussion group at Anniston/ Calhoun Library, Reading Our Lives and Writing Our Lives, also at Anniston/Calhoun Library and a local writing group in Jacksonville.



Sister Janice Costello, O. P.

The appeal of the gulf and Mobile is partially responsible for the retirement of Sister Janice Costello, O. P., on May 31, after 45 years in education, the last six of which have been as a librarian at Houston Cole Library. Sister Ianice has spent years in the classroom, as an administrator and as a librarian.

Sister Janice earned the B. A. degree in elementary education at Edgewood College in Madison, Wisconsin. She later earned the M. A. degree in library science at Dominican University in River Forest, Illinois, and a second master's in education and administration at Delta State University in Cleveland, Mississippi, where she spent six years as librarian.

Twenty-two of Sister Janice's 45 years in education have been spent in the South. During her six years here at ISU, Sister Janice has received Faculty Research Award certificates presented by Dr. David Watts, Vice President of Academic Affairs for 1993-94, 1995-96 and 1996-97.

She and Kaye Batchelor have planned and mounted the historical and educational displays in the lobby of Houston Cole Library. Sister lanice has been funded to spend a month this

October in Rome, Italy, at Angelicum College where she will create a video to teach students there how to do research in their own library.

Sister Janice's memberships include American Library Association, the Association of College Research Libraries, Alabama Library Association and Phi Delta Kappa.


## Did You Know?

Among Alabama's academic institutions. Houston Cole Library is the second most active (after Auburn) net interlibrary lender of books to public libraries.

In 1996-97, Houston Cole Library added 12,588 volumes of books and bound periodicals, to bring its total volume count to 627,698.

Last year's Houston Cole Library door counts exceeded a quarter million, and over a half million photocopies were made on the library's copy machines.
