

How to manage the disruptive, distressed or threatening student

I receive calls or email messages frequently from concerned faculty and staff about a student who is exhibiting behavior that is not consistent with normative expectations. Thus, what should faculty and staff do when a student is not acting in a manner conducive to learning and development? How should faculty and staff respond? The first step is to ascertain what is going on. Is the student being disruptive? Is the student distressed? Or is the student engaged in threatening behavior?

Disruptive behaviors in the classroom or office interrupt the learning and development process but do not rise to the level where an intervention is necessary. Examples of disruptive behavior may

include: eating in class (unless approved by DSS), cell phone use during instruction, persistent interruptions in class or in the office, demands for an immediate response or answer, and so forth and so on. If disruptive behaviors persist, faculty and staff can notify the Director of Community Standards & Student Ethics, Ms. Lauren Lowell for guidance.

Distressed students, on the other hand, require an intervention. Distress can take many forms, for example, inconsistent work submissions, infrequent class attendance, marked changes in personal hygiene, impaired speech and disjointed thoughts. repeated requests for special considerations and bizarre behavior that is inappropriate or incongruent with the situation. Remember that distressed students are not violent students! They merely need assistance. If vou encounter a distressed student, ensure that student knows about the many resources on campus for assistance such as: Counseling Services, Disability Support Services, RMC Student Health Center, Dean of Students Office, Vice President for Student Affairs, and the Behavioral Concerns Team.

There has been a great deal of media attention in recent years about violence on college campuses, particularly active shooter violence. These violent outbursts have impacted higher education and created anxiety for faculty, staff and students. Most students are not violent, and university communities must be

careful before labeling a student as violent. The key point to remember is that any encounter with a student that induces fear for personal safety or safety of students needs to be addressed. Examples of threatening behavior may include: use of profanity, verbal abuse, harassment, direct or implied threats of violence, physical violence, stalking, intimidation and destruction of property.

The first response for faculty and staff who feel unsafe is to contact 911. If the situation is not an immediate threat, but is concerning, contact the University Police Department or the Behavioral Concerns Team for an assessment. If a student needs to be removed from class, contact the Director of Community Standards & Student Ethics for a consultation. Or contact the Vice President for Student Affairs for a review.

Enterprise Holdings, better known as, Enterprise Rent-A-Car (ERAC) has reportedly hired 14 full-time JSU Gamecocks in 2016. JSU is ranked 2nd among all of the colleges that ERAC recruits from in the U.S. Positions range from Area Manager, Senior Truck Account Specialist, to Internships.

<u>UNDERGRADUATE</u> ADMISSIONS

200 campus tours have been completed thus far in the 2016-2017 academic year with 1,131 prospective students attending. Group tours are scheduled each week on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday beginning and ending at the Library at 10 am and 2 pm. Individual family tours are scheduled each week on Tuesday and Thursday beginning and ending at the Visitor Center at 9 am, 11 am, 1 pm and 3 pm.

Many prospective students and their family members visited the campus during the fall and spring semesters as follows:

- 2,069 attended Preview Days
- 462 attended Accepted Student Days
- 152 attended Transfer Day
- 202 attended Emerging Leaders Day

Fall 2017 Preview Day is scheduled for October 14.

Admissions Advisors attended 564 events during fall 2016 and have attended or are scheduled to attend 366 events so far this spring. Additionally, the Admission Advisors hosted the Counselor Luncheon on March 3rd at the Houston Cole Library where 43 high school counselors attended.

The CORE Scholars Coordinator and Specialists have visited 246 high schools thus far this 2016-2017 academic year.
