#### The History of Juneteenth

June 19th, otherwise known as
Juneteenth (a mix of the words June and
Nineteenth), marks the freedom of
African Americans from slavery in the
U.S. It is on this day in 1865 that Major
General George Granger made his last
stop in Galveston Bay, Texas to inform
slaves that slavery had been abolished.
Though it is important to note that it
took nearly 2 1/2 years after the initial
abolition for all slaves to be freed.
Nevertheless, this 'Day of Freedom' holds
a special place in our hearts and
history.






## Remembering Tina Turner
