LGBTQIA+ HISTORY MONTH

LGBTQIA+ History Month was first observed in 1994! It was Rodney Wilson, a Missouri High school Teacher, who felt that a month needed to be dedicated to teaching LGBT+ history. Wilson gathered other teachers and community leaders and they chose October due to it being a month that school is in session and the month of National Coming Out Day (Oct 11th).

The LGBT community is the only community not taught their histories at home or in schools, and this can be detrimental to the youth. Growing up with no LGBTQ+ representations can lead to internal struggles with identity. Having LGBTQ+ History Month means a lot! It allows for youth to have positive queer role models, build communities, and gives them the opportunity to see queer people such as themselves in positions of success.



What Does LGBTQIA+ Stand For?

LESBIAN

A female who is romantically or sexually attracted to another female

GAY

A male who is romantically or sexually attracted to another male

BI(SEXUAL)

A person who is romantically or sexually attracted to two or more genders

TRANS(GENDER)

A person whose gender identity differs from their assigned gender at birth

QUEER\QUESTIONING

A person who is exploring their gender, sexual identiy, and sexual orientation

INTERSEX

A person whose sexual anatomy differs from the traditional definitions of male and female

ASEXUAL\AROMANTIC

Asexual describes a person who has little to no sexual attraction towards another. Aromantic describes a person who has little to no romanic attraction to another

PLUS SIGN (+)

A representation of other gender and sexual identities that aren't included in the initialism

The Spotlight

Who are you?

My name is Dr. Ashley Turner. I am an assistant professor of biology for the Department of Biology at Jax State.

What inspired you to work at Jax State?

I was looking to start my independent professorship in an environment and community where I could grow, not only my teaching and research, but also my advocacy for diversity and inclusion for students inside and outside of the classroom. Jax State has been this and so much more.

As someone who works in the Department of Biology, what is your research focus?

For our research lab, we coined ourselves "The Worm Hole." We use a microscopic nematode (roundworms), C. elegans, in our genetics research to bridge the gap between nematode and humans for exploring human disease.

Where did the name 'The Worm Hole' come from?

Nematodes have similar genes or orthologs that humans have, and they often have similar functions, believe it or not. This allows us to ask a question in a nematode that we want to study in a human, right? Worm holes in space in theory are passages that could create shortcuts across the universe. Our lab uses the roundworm model to help bridge the gap between nematodes and humans. That is where the name came from, the name came from the connection that we're making from a nematode model to a human disease and bridging that gap through basic and translational research.

That is like how humans have similar DNA to bananas, correct?

Yes, humans, bananas, trees, plants, dogs, cats, and nematodes all have the basis of DNA, and genes evolve over time and have unique functions in organisms. But at the basic level, all living organisms have a set of DNA instructions that encode who we are. At the core of DNA, we are all the same.

In what ways are you involved on campus?

My appointment is in the Department of Biology, and

I have a wide array of teaching, research, and service activities. A lot of my service across campus is through outreach. I collaborate with public educators in middle and high school classrooms to engage students through biology and genetics by bringing nematodes and more into their classroom spaces. My efforts also reach into the diversity and inclusion realm, supporting and advocating for diverse individuals. Two new leadership and advisory roles I am stepping into this semester include serving as the new incoming president of the LGBTQ+ Faculty & Staff Collective and a coadvisor for the student group Full Spectrum.

Can you talk about what is the LGBTQ+ Faculty and Staff Collective?

That is a faculty and staff organized group at Jax State that focuses on contributing and supporting a welcoming and inclusive environment for lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer, and ally faculty and staff. We supply support and mentoring for LGBTQ+ students, strengthen outreach to and retention of our LGBTQ+ faculty, staff, and students, and supply opportunities for fun social events and professional networking within the JSU (Jacksonville State University) community. Building community and advocating for queer individuals on campus are our main goals. We meet monthly to discuss the latest LGBTQ+ issues. Is there anything else that you would like to share?

I am so thrilled to be at Jax State and part of this community, including our LGBTQ+ community. I am a proud member of the LGBTQ+ community, and identify as queer, lesbian, and a cis-gender woman. It is important for queer-identifying students and really all students to know, see, communicate, and collaborate with other queer individuals and professionals in STEM. I am part of a growing body of queer scientists around the world sharing our stories and journey through a project called 500 Queer Scientists at www.500queerscientists.com We are here. We are beautiful and amazing! Love you and be you in all the spaces you are in!
