# IAEM-USA President, Marty Schaub, Discusses What Lies Ahead in 2019

In the most recent IAEM Bulletin, IAEM-USA President, Marty Schaub, highlighted key considerations of the ways emergency management will change shape in upcoming years. Key considerations that Schaub addressed include government affairs, climate, and technology.

In relation to government affairs, the current government shutdown restricts FEMA from working on anything that is not immediate disaster-related including mitigation planning, developments for EPMG support, and hiring of personnel to fill vacant positions. In relation to climate, Schaub discusses the impacts of climate change and El Nino, while also highlighting trends and changes in technology. 
