Each year, Faculty Commons invites JSU faculty members to share a glimpse of their scholarly and creative research activities from the previous academic year with their peers at the annual Faculty Awards event.

Our goal is to highlight faculty engaged in research who make meaningful contributions to the university and their field. Faculty who submit research activity are recognized at the annual Faculty Awards celebration, both in the digital program and during the ceremony. Additionally, faculty will receive a printed certificate from Faculty Commons.

The due date for the 2025 Faculty Research Activity Recognition submissions ended March 14, 2025. To be recognized, faculty must complete the Faculty Research Activity Recognition form. Submissions are limited to three research work entries per faculty member for program inclusion. Recognized works include peer-reviewed journal articles, book chapters, conference presentations, professional research awards, creative works (e.g., performances or exhibits), patents, or similar outputs.
