The College of Health Professions and Wellness recently received a grant from the Community Foundation of Northeast Alabama's Stringfellow Health Fund to provide health fairs for the Anniston community. The funds will enable the college to provide much needed health education and services to underserved communities.

Led by JSU Nursing, a health fair will be held at the Carver Community Center on October 12th and 13th. With the grant funding, JSU faculty and students will offer screenings for blood pressure, cholesterol, blood glucose, weight, and

body mass index (BMI). Additionally, education for smoking/vaping cessation will be conducted.

As October is "Exercise is Medicine" month, the college will deliver information about the program. It is the goal of JSU College of Nursing to be active participants in making a difference in the health of local communities.



Gamecock Gallop 5K Set to Assist Kinesiology Students

Jacksonville State University's Gamecock Gallop 5K began in 2001 to support students within the Department of Kinesiology. Now in its 20th year, over 5000 runners and walkers from Calhoun, Etowah, St. Clair, Talladega, Cherokee, Birmingham, and many other Alabama counties have participated. The Gallop has consistently been a part of the Anniston Runner's Club Grand Prix Race Series.

Most importantly, proceeds from the Gamecock Gallop provide Health, Physical Education, Exercise Science, Sport Management, and Recreation students at JSU an opportunity to attend professional conferences in their field so they may excel as leaders and promote running/walking/movement along with the benefits of staying fit. These professional development opportunities assist the students in becoming leaders in their fields.

Professors at Jacksonville State University Nursing hold a wealth of knowledge in a variety of subjects. In the newly published book Primary Care Pediatrics for the Nurse Practitioner, Drs. Allison Crabtree, Jennifer Frank, Tammy Morrow, and Mrs. Jenna McDonald collaborated with Dr. Pamela Biernacki of Georgetown University to author a chapter on pediatric prescribing. Some of the key points of the writing include pediatric dosing safety, research, writing prescriptions, and the overuse of antibiotic therapy.

The opportunity to contribute to this publication occurred in 2020 when primary editor, Theresa Kyle and Springer Publishing editor Hannah Hicks approached Dr. Crabtree about assisting with this important chapter in the new textbook. Dr. Frank, Mrs. McDonald, and Dr. Morrow joined when notified of the need for contributors. After much work, the book was published in 2021. The book was developed to prepare future pediatric and family

nurse practitioners for practice in the 21st century. Springer Publishing editors felt there was a need for an engaging, student-friendly text that graduates would study and keep for reference in their future practice for years to come. In searching for clinical expertise, they found Jacksonville State University Nursing.
