# **University Dedicates JSU South Complex**

It's been more than five years since a tornado struck Wallace Hall, home to JSU's School of Nursing. After 17 semesters of holding classes in Houston Cole Library, the nationally-ranked program is reunited at the newly renovated JSU South.

Opened in 1976 as Jacksonville Hospital, the 104-bed facility was donated to the university by Northeast Alabama Regional Medical Center a few months after the 2018 tornado. Work began in 2021 to transform the space into a state-of-the-art teaching facility, to include:

- Four lecture classrooms with seating for 125 students
- Renovation of existing space for nursing arts and skills labs
- Athletic Training Classroom and Lab
- A student lounge
- Study space
- A dining area, which includes a Boar's Head deli operated by JSU Dining

In addition to the School of Nursing, JSU South is also home to Respiratory Therapy, Athletic Training, and the JSU/RMC Student Health Center. The local community will be invited to an open house in February.



Our accrediting body, the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE), holds the JSU School of Nursing (SON) accountable for meeting the Essentials (American Association of Colleges of Nursing,



2008/2011) as well as other standards that support quality, integrity, and achievement of our mission, vision, and goals. The accreditation process includes a written self-study, which provides evidence that the JSU SON programs meet accreditation standards, and an on-site visit by a team of accreditation visitors.


## **JSU Respiratory Therapy Program Hosts CoARC Visit**

The last full week in October of each year is designated National Respiratory Care Week. This recognition was started by President Ronald Reagen in the 1980s. This year, JSU RT spent our Respiratory Care Week hosting an accreditation site visit team. On October 26th and 27th, JSU RT hosted a site visit team from the Commission on Accreditation for Respiratory Care (CoARC). This



site visit is one of the final steps in the approval process to allow our program to advance from Provisional Accreditation (awarded when opened the program in 2017) to Continued Accreditation.

The site visit went extremely well. The JSU RT Community showed strong support for our program during the site visit. The site visit team met with current JSU RT Students, previous graduates, clinical preceptors, JSU Administration, JSU RT Medical Director Dr. Rohit Patel, JSU RT Faculty and Staff, and met with our JSU RT Advisory Board. The Advisory Board members are RT leaders from facilities that our program partners with for clinical sites. We had over 30 members on campus to show support for our program. We are excited to share that the site visit team found no citations or findings of not meeting our accreditation standards. They shared a long list of strengths that they observed from the program and were impressed by the support from JSU Admin and the JSU RT Community. Their report has been submitted to the CoARC Executive Office for review. It will also be reviewed by our assigned Program Referee. If neither of these reviews require any additional information, our program will be recommended for Continued Accreditation at the March 2024 CoARC Board meeting.

Justin Files and the JSU Athletic Training staff were in the athletic training room getting ready for their football game. They were gathering all their supplies to head to the field for pre-game warm-

ups. This is a normal occurrence for any athletic trainer as they prepare to go provide care to their athletes for an athletic contest. But what happened next was not an ordinary thing. Justin was summoned that a fan was unresponsive just outside the football building. He immediately jumped into action and responded. His response included performing CPR, using an AED, and saving a life.

The three members of the JSU athletic training staff – Assistant athletic trainers Justin Files and Danielle Jefferson and head athletic trainer Michael Polascik, responded and provided vital aid. The JSU MAT program is excited to recognize Justin for his quick thinking and use of what he learned in the program to save a life! ### **Education Alum Establishes Scholarship to Support Future Teachers**

All anyone needs to know about Coach Mark Sanders can be summarized by his response to a single question: "How are you doing?"

"If things were going any better, I'd have to be three different people," he said. "I just can't imagine being any more blessed."

Sanders and his wife, Dawn, wanted to share those blessings with others by establishing the Coach Mark and Dawn Sanders Scholarship at Jacksonville State. It's awarded to a junior or senior studying education or wellness.

"We understand the powerful influence that teachers and coaches can have," said Sanders, who has spent 22 years coaching. "We know firsthand how difficult it is to afford college, especially now, and our heart is in helping people who can one day have a powerful influence on the next generation. We want to add value to leaders who can then multiply that value to others."

Sanders, who attended nearby Alexandria High School, knew as far back as seventh grade that he wanted to be a teacher and a baseball coach.

"I always had a passion for people," Sanders said. "I knew how to communicate with people, how

to motivate people and how to help them grow. I also loved sports, and combining those skills and passions just made sense."

After high school, Sanders received an athletic scholarship to Emmanuel College, a four-year school in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) about 100 miles north of Atlanta. It was there he learned a harsh truth.

"I realized pretty early on that I was not going to make a career out of playing baseball," he said, laughing, "so I decided to come home to JSU, to get my teaching certificate."

To pay his way through JSU, Sanders worked multiple jobs and took out student loans. He graduated in 1997.

"What really stands out to me in terms of my time at JSU is clearly the teachers," he said. "I had some outstanding teachers who believed in me and who saw a real potential in me. They also helped me see the importance of valuing and adding value to students."

Those lessons carried over to being a coach. "Leadership is simply influence," he said.

In 1998, Sanders got his first job teaching at Westbook Christian School in Rainbow City, Ala., where he also coached football, baseball and basketball. He then moved to Riverchase Middle School to be its new softball coach.

"I didn't want to coach softball," he said. "I had no interest at all in coaching softball."

The Riverchase principal sweetened the offer by telling Sanders that the baseball coach was looking to move up and he could have the job if he proved himself well with the softball team.

"And what he told me was that the softball program had not been very good," Sanders said. "I didn't know exactly what that meant...were they .500 or maybe a little below .500?"

Not even close. Riverchase Middle School hadn't won a single game in three years when Sanders took over the program.

"I felt sick," he said. "I'm a competitive person, and I didn't know how I was going to improve this team."

To make matters worse, the best middle school softball teams in Alabama were in Sanders' conference.

"We just started dreaming and scheming – and ended up winning 11 games in that same conference in our first year," he said.

In 2009, Sanders was named head softball coach of Helena Middle School during its inaugural season – where he has built a dynasty. Over the past seven season, the Huskies went 205-12. In 2017, they were 34-1, and went undefeated in 2018, 2019 and 2022. Helena High School has played in three straight Class 6A state softball tournaments.

In May, Coach Sanders was named head softball coach at Helena High School – continuing with the sport he originally only took on as a placeholder. He hopes future scholarship recipients share his passion for leadership as teachers and coaches.

"It means everything," he said. "We want to be outrageously generous by investing in people who will have influence on the next generation."
