JSU School of Nursing Ranked Among Nation's Best Programs

<u>Niche.com</u>, a nationally recognized site that provides rankings, report cards and reviews of colleges and universities, has named the Jacksonville State University <u>School of Nursing</u> to its list of <u>Best College Nursing Programs in America</u>.

Using key statistics and student reviews from data provided by the US Department of Education, the site ranked Jax State Nursing No. 51 out of 774 programs across the nation.

"We are honored at the recognition of our program," said Dr. Betsy Gulledge, Chief Nursing Administrator and associate dean of the <u>College of Health Professions and Wellness</u>. "JSU has been recognized as having a stellar nursing program for quite some time, however, we certainly appreciate when outside entities recognize us as well."

Housed within the College of Health Professions and Wellness, the School of Nursing is one of the largest units on JSU's campus. It offers a <u>Bachelor of Science in Nursing</u>, <u>Master of Science in Nursing</u>, <u>Doctor of Nursing Practice</u>, and a <u>RN-to-BSN program</u>. This school year, the program moved into a state-of-the-art training facility, the JSU South Complex, which once served as a local hospital.

"The school strives to provide a top-notch educational experience in order to prepare its students to care for anyone, anytime, anywhere," Gulledge said. "I am incredibly proud and humbled by the many nurse educators and clinical agencies that work together in order to ensure our students are well-prepared for an ever-evolving healthcare environment."



Respiratory Therapy Program Gains Accreditation

JSU's Respiratory Therapy Program has gained continued accreditation from the Commission on Accreditation for Respiratory Care (CoARC).

"It is a complete, and I do mean complete, and thorough examination of the program," said Ed Goodwin, program director. "They look at everything from the curriculum – making sure you're covering the most up-to-date content to application rates, acceptance rates, pass rates, community support and support from the university – making sure we have the facilities that we need. They want to make sure we're doing the absolute best to prepare our graduates to enter the field of respiratory therapy."

In 2015, the program was granted an "Approval of Intent" from CoARC to start the accreditation process. Provisional accreditation was awarded in July 2017, with the program admitting its first cohort of students in Fall 2017 and graduating its first class in Spring 2019. It took three years for the program to build up enough graduate data to gain continued accreditation.

"This is just the next step in the journey," Goodwin said. "This proves that JSU is committed to the program. JSU has provided phenomenal resources, classroom space, state-of-the art facilities. Everything we need, we have – all of which allows us to become the largest bachelor's program in the state."

CoArc will repeat the process again in five years. If that is a success, it moves to every 10 years. "This shows, beyond a shadow of a doubt, that we are preparing our graduates to become respiratory therapists," Goodwin said. "It's such a needed field. We often hear of shortages of health care workers in other fields, but respiratory therapy is not often mentioned. RT gained a lot of press during the pandemic discussing our staffing shortages due to the ventilator shortage, but those staffing issues started before the pandemic. The profession continues to evolve and grow, and RT programs are seeing a lot of growth in our state. JSU RT is a part of that." JSU offers two options for the bachelor's degree in respiratory therapy:

- 1. **Entry-Into-Practice**: This traditional option is designed for students wanting to enter the field. It requires approximately two years of prerequisite coursework before beginning the fivesemester respiratory therapy program. Graduates become eligible to take their national credentialing exams that lead to the RRT credentials.
- 2. **RRT-BSRT Bridge Program**: This degree advancement option is designed for practicing respiratory therapists who have completed an accredited associate degree in respiratory

therapy and earned their RRT credential. They can advance their degree to the baccalaureate level at JSU through this online option.

Applications for the Entry-Into-Practice option are open between Feb. 1-June 1 each year, for admission into the fall semester. This option only admits into the fall semester. The RRT-BSRT Bridge Program, or degree advancement option, is 100% online and accepts applications every semester. For more information, visit the <u>Respiratory Therapy website</u>.

As many know, Cindy has been responsible, many times, for ensuring our programs move forward, even during times of uncertainty. Following the tornado in 2018, Cindy and her team worked tirelessly to ensure continuity in

learning for students. In addition, her work during the COVID pandemic was paramount and essential in us maintaining the nursing program during that time. Her input during the renovation phase of South Complex (Annex and Main) will also leave a lasting legacy of her time at JSU. Above all else, Cindy loves her time with students and faculty. She is dearly loved and appreciated by all that work with her and those she serves. Her laugh is infectious and her energy and zest for the job, admirable. As she retires July 1st of this year, her absence will leave a tremendous void in our SON; however, in true Cindy fashion, she is not totally leaving. She will remain a clinical associate, continuing to assist in the lab on a part-time basis. Her work over the years has made an indelible mark on the School of Nursing and College of Health Professions and Wellness.



Nursing Wing of JSU South to be Named in Memory of 1973 Alumna



Lynne Cobb Parker could have enjoyed a career in gospel music. The Weaver, Ala., native recorded several albums with her sister and father throughout her childhood as the Bill Cobb Trio, touring with gospel greats. But she was inspired to minister to people through a different path – nursing.

Jacksonville State had just opened its nursing program when Lynne graduated from nearby Jacksonville High School. The opportunity seemed too good to be true, but she worried how she was going to fund her education. Luckily, with her strong academic record, she was awarded a nursing scholarship. It would forever change her life.

Lynne graduated from JSU in 1973 in the second class of nursing students ever to complete the

program. Her life on campus was busy with side jobs, Phi Mu and other extracurricular activities. She launched her career at Anniston Memorial Hospital, now known as Northeast Alabama Regional Medical Center, where she enjoyed working on the med/surgery floor.

Her next big opportunity came when she was offered a full scholarship at the University of Alabama at Birmingham to pursue a Master of Science in Nursing. At first she commuted three days a week to Birmingham while continuing to work nights in Anniston, but ultimately, she decided to pause her career so she could finish



the degree program faster. Her husband – Brock Parker – was her biggest cheerleader.

"She graduated with a 4.0 grade point average," Brock said proudly. "She even had one of her papers published in the American Journal of Nursing while still a student there."

After graduate school, Lynne accepted a position at Baptist Medical Center South in Montgomery. As the hospital's first nurse with a graduate education, they weren't sure at first how to put her talents to use. After a brief stint in staff education, she asked to be moved to the med/surgery floor. The bonds she made there with doctors and fellow nurses would form the backbone of her future career accomplishments. She was soon asked to serve as Assistant Director of Nursing, then Director of Nursing, but she maintained her presence on the floors, making rounds.

After a few years, Lynne traded her nurse whites for a tailored suit when she was named Hospital Administrator of Baptist South – becoming its first woman executive.

"It was her education, work ethic and ability to communicate and develop relationships with doctors, nurses, managers, staff and – most of all – patients, that enabled her to be successful," Brock said.

During her time at Baptist, Lynne guided the hospital's growth through many advances in healthcare. One of her significant contributions was partnering with UAB to establish a residency program to attract doctors and nurses. She was also successful at incorporating the Montgomery Cancer Center with Baptist South, as well as opening the Crossbridge Mental Health Facility. She retired as CEO of Baptist South after 38 years in healthcare.

"It all started with a JSU scholarship and believing in herself," Brock said.

The couple spent their retirement traveling the world. "We were very fortunate to be able to just pull the door shut and leave," Brock said. "No kids, no dogs and – most of all – no cell phones."

In what would become their last trip, a three-week cruise in Europe, Brock noticed Lynne didn't look well. After a brief talk about flying home, Lynne said she just wanted to finish the vacation as planned. "I suspect that her years of observing symptoms told her all she needed to know," Brock said.

By the time they arrived back home in Montgomery, Lynne was very ill. She was diagnosed with pancreatic cancer and began treatment immediately. Sadly, on May 31, 2022, she passed.

"She was finally in the Heaven she sang about for so many years," Brock said, adding that, even in her last six months of life, his wife's courage and faith served as an example to others.

When asked what made their marriage so special, Brock said theirs was a truly "synergistic relationship" and they were "worth more together than the sum of their two parts." The couple met in sixth grade and were married nearly 49 years.

"I was able to get her to close the books and have fun," he said. "She was able to show me there's more to life than having fun – it has to have meaning, worth."

Though the tears still come freely, Brock knows how lucky he was to have shared a life with his best friend. To honor her memory and support the education of future nurses, he gives back to the JSU School of Nursing. He ensured the nursing wing of the newly renovated JSU South Complex was named the Lynne Cobb Parker Wing. He has also established the Lynne Cobb Parker Memorial Nursing Scholarship on campus.

"I am blessed with the opportunity to contribute to the JSU School of Nursing, where a kid from Weaver was able to flourish because of her dedication to her goals and a JSU scholarship," Brock said. "Perhaps it will serve as an inspiration for others."
