INTRODUCTION

The Social Work collection is adequate to support the courses taught in the Bachelor and Master of Social Work degree programs. Complete conspectus sheets and checklists are available upon request for a more detailed examination of the collection.

HOLDINGS

The Social Work collection contains **51,958** titles in the H, HM, HN, HQ, HS, HT, and HV1 – HV5840 call number ranges, including 16,689 e-books. Total monograph expenditures for Social Work from 2018/2019 - 2023/2024 were **\$111,876.70** with 1,613 new titles added. These newer additions comprise 3% of the current Social Work collection.

These numbers represent a snapshot of the collection as titles are continually being added and withdrawn for collection maintenance and growth. These numbers do not represent additional titles available through e-book databases.

PERIODICALS AND SERIALS

The Library has access to full-text journals available throughout the Library databases. There are over 145 journals available electronically through database subscriptions, 109 of which are peer-reviewed. These can be found in EBSCO's Publication Finder at http://bit.ly/3t6DOeH. The Serials expenditures in Social Work for both print and electronic subscriptions and standing orders average \$27,125.49 from FY 2018/2019 to FY 2023-2024 (see table below).

SUMMARY

Strengths:

Total holdings, conspectus evaluation, and checklist comparisons indicate the overall Social Work collection is more than adequate to support the curriculum. Of particular note on the conspectus worksheets are the holdings in the subject areas of: Family, Marriage, Women, Sexual Life and Social Work, Social & Public Welfare.

A review of the journal holdings reveals that the Social Work collection is adequate to support the curriculum.

Weaknesses:

Total holdings, conspectus evaluations, and checklist comparisons indicate that the weakest areas of the Social Work subject areas are: Social History, Social Problems, Social Reform, in addition to Societies – Secret, Benevolent, etc., as well as Communities, Classes, Races.

Recommendations:

The growth rate of the Social Work Collection should be maintained in order to continue providing support for the Bachelor and Master of Social Work degree programs. The monograph collection should be generally increased, based on budget, with a strong focus on core and outstanding titles. The periodical collection available via databases is substantial and should be maintained. The weak subject areas (noted above) should also be addressed with additional acquisitions as determined by academic need and budget allowances.
