## **Director's Notes**

The campaign for women's suffrage represents a seminal political and social development in both the United States and England. "Votes for Women!", first produced in 1907, is one of several plays written in the early 20th century which uses the suffrage campaign as an impetus to explore many issues beyond the demand for the franchise. Elizabeth Robins anticipates the "new" feminist movement begun in the 1960s. Her work reinforces the point of the title of Dale Spender's 1983 study of the movement, *There's Always Been a Women's Movement This Century*. Lady John's warning to Vida Levering against encouraging "this ferment of feminism" is only one of many instances in the play which illustrates this point. Robins represents one of the many "forgotten" women who, throughout the centuries, have provided a "voice in the wilderness" in women's struggle for equality. My use of the religious allusion is not accidental. Robins and women like her have approached their commitment to feminism with the zeal of Biblical prophets. Ethel Smyth's suffrage anthem "March of the Women" equates the work of the suffragettes with the "Thunder of freedom, the voice of the Lord!" The final verse of the song provides a stirring call to committed action:

Life, strife—these two are one, Naught can ye win but by faith and daring. On, on—that ye have done But for the work of today preparing. Firm in reliance, laugh a defiance, (Laugh in hope, for sure is the end)

The "end" finally came for the English suffragettes in 1928, when all women over the age of twenty-one were given the franchise. The struggle for equality continues.
